The Idaho State Police Forensic Services Forensic is pleased to provide information on *Idaho overdose coroner education and toxicology training and Randox MultiSTAT validation*

Overdoses within the State of Idaho exceed 300 in 2022 and have increased consistently over the last five years. Coroners, within the State of Idaho, are paramount to public health data and safety measurements within communities. This project will support coroners throughout the state, providing them with hands-on, in-person training ultimately giving them the resources to identify potential overdoses, conduct appropriate testing, obtain almost immediate results, and submit the data through OD Map.

Additionally, coroners gain a basic understanding of forensic toxicology and interpreting test results, enabling them to differentiate overdose cases from long-term substance use, distinguish suicides from accidents, and accurately complete death certificates. The training program is essential for preparing coroners to conduct precise overdose death investigations. It provides the skills and knowledge necessary to ensure justice and accurate documentation in probable overdose deaths.

The Randox MultiSTAT instrument has been validated in the Idaho State Police Meridian Laboratory for the purposes of providing rapid toxicology screening for coroners. The validation process, as well as case comparison studies, will be discussed.
