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WHO ARE WE? AGENCY OVERVIEW

The men and women of the Idaho State Police provide law enforcement and public safety services to the people in Idaho. These services include Patrol, Criminal Investigations, Forensic Services, Management Services, Planning, Grants & Research, Brands, the Racing Commission, and the Idaho Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Academy. ISP also maintains the state's criminal history records and a number of registries as required by law. ISP's Bureau of Alcohol Beverage Control provides licensing, education, and enforcement for over 7,000 alcohol licenses.

The Director of the Idaho State Police is Colonel Kedrick R. Wills. Col. Wills was appointed Director by Governor Otter in 2017 after joining the Idaho State Police in 1996. He leads an agency authorized for 616 full-time positions, including 316 commissioned troopers, detectives, and commercial vehicle safety specialists.

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ISP Headquarters are located in Meridian, Idaho. Six regional districts serve the state:

District 1, Coeur d'Alene: Kootenai, Benewah, Bonner, Boundary and Shoshone Counties.

District 2, Lewiston: Latah, Lewis, Nez Perce, Clearwater and Idaho Counties.

District 3, Meridian: Ada, Adams, Boise, Canyon, Elmore, Gem, Owyhee, Payette, Valley and Washington Counties.

District 4, Jerome: Camas, Blaine, Lincoln, Gooding, Cassia, Minidoka, Jerome and Twin Falls Counties.

District 5: Pocatello: Bear Lake, Caribou, Franklin, Oneida, Bingham, Power and Bannock Counties.

District 6, Idaho Falls: Butte, Custer, Lemhi, Clark, Fremont, Madison, Teton, Jefferson and Bonneville Counties.


REVENUE & EXPENDITURES

Idaho State Police receives the majority of revenue from dedicated funding sources. These sources include user fees or taxes that are collected to finance a specific service or project. Examples of dedicated funds of ISP sources are the fuel tax and monies collected from vehicle registration for patrol.



Federal funds received by ISP include those used directly for specific programs, or passed through to other state and local governments for criminal justice activities.
